Objectives of the Course:

The main objectives of the course are to:

- Introduce a historical and geo-political landscape of the Middle East.
- Examine the origins of the faith in Arabia, its development and geographical and contextual expansion.
- Address the ideologised version of the religion in the shape of Islamic fundamentalism.
