Objectives of the Course

The main objectives of the course are to:

1. To introduce the student to various established analytical techniques applicable to tonal and/or non-tonal music
2. To examine the technical development of the tonal language in the nineteenth century and its relation to musical structure
3. To examine the development of form in the 19th and the 20th-century
4. To equip students with the ability to express themselves critically about various technical/stylistic aspects of works of the standard repertoire
