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| <p>The main objectives of the course are to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Develop a broader social science theoretical perspective on groups and the more specific theories connected to group therapy.• Explore the different stages of group development and how to evaluate the effectiveness of groups.• Explore and analyse the main group leadership theories, their own facilitation style, and their role in supporting the emergence of group leadership as a collective phenomenon.• Develop an awareness of their own personal characteristics and how these are related to group leadership.• Develop an understanding of the special challenges of doing group work in an institutional setting.• Challenge their own ethical and professional standards, and to provide them with the tools needed to interpret and translate general ethical guidelines into appropriate and specific principles that will govern their practice |
