# **Course Objectives:**

This is the first of a three-semester practicum seminar sequence. The first semester aims to:

- 1. Introduce students to the frame of clinical work and the applications of basic principles of psychotherapy prior to beginning their practicum placements.
- 2. Familiarize students with the policies and procedures of clinical practicum.
- 3. Expose students to clinical material and live case consultations and presentations by guest presenters so as to initiate them to the process of case conceptualization, therapy process and supervision.
- 4. Provide a forum for self-reflection, personal and professional development for clinical psychology trainees.
- 5. Introduce students to clinical practicum policies and procedures, the implementation of the code of professional and ethical conduct, note taking, maintaining client records and performing intake assessments and evaluations.

### **Learning Outcomes:**

After completion of the first Practicum Seminar students are expected to:

- 1. Demonstrate familiarity with policies and procedures of clinical practicum.
- 2. Demonstrate good knowledge of the professional code of ethics and conduct and behave ethically and professionally.



- 3. Possess the necessary skills of writing substantial session notes and maintaining client records.
- 4. Conceptualize and formulate clinical cases.
- 5. Demonstrate competence in clinical interviewing skills.
- 6. Conduct thorough intake and risk assessments.
- 7. Engage in self-reflection to identify potential emotional barriers to professional development as clinical psychologists.
- 8. Experiment with the role of being peer supervisors and consultants.

#### **Course Content:**

- 1. The role of a clinical psychologist
- 2. Telephone contact with clients
- 3. Conducting intake assessments
- 4. Establishing rapport with clients
- 5. Communication and clinical interviewing skills
- 6. Clinical practicum policies and procedures
- 7. Maintaining client records
- 8. The process of clinical supervision
- 9. Programs for prevention and intervention
- 10. Crisis Intervention

### **Learning Activities and Teaching Methods:**

Clinical case presentations, Role-playing exercises, Group exercises, Practical applications, Peer supervision
