### **Objectives of the Course:**

This course will explore the changing role of the EU on the world stage. As a dominant global trade actor, with an ever increasing role on issues of human rights, development aid, environmental affairs, as well as a growing political and strategic presence worldwide, the EU is progressively recognised as a significant partner to other major actors in world affairs and as an actor in its own right. The objective of this course is to delve into the key issues which affect and determine the Union's international role and identity. This is achieved by first examining how the limited role that countries of Europe came to assume in the immediate aftermath of the Second World War's catastrophe and the onset of the Cold War was to a considerable extent restored with the development, growth and maturity of the EEC/EU. The growing global influence of the organisation will thus be examined by exploring key areas, such as trade and economic policy, enlargement, neighbourhood policy, human rights, development policy, humanitarian aid, Common Foreign and Security Policy (CFSP), as well as European Security and Defence Policy (ESDP). Against this background, the course assesses the EU's relations with its peripheries as well as with the rest of the world, and critically evaluates the challenges facing the organisation today.

### **Learning Outcomes:**

Upon completion of the course students are expected to be able to:

1. Illustrate an understanding of the evolution of the changing context of pre- and post-Cold War realities in Europe.
2. Evaluate and criticize the complexity of the EU's governance system in a comparative context.
3. Demonstrate knowledge for the process of European economic integration and appreciate the emergence of the EU as an economic global actor.
4. Assess the importance of the EU as a 'soft power'.
5. Evaluate 'soft power' politics by studying the EU's development aid policy, neighbourhood policy, as well as enlargement and membership conditionality.
6. Illustrate an appreciation of the international role of the EU in environmental affairs and assess the problem of energy dependence in the EU.
7. Critically appraise the EU's common foreign and security policy as well as its security and defence policy.

8. Demonstrate knowledge and understanding of the EU's transatlantic relations, its role as an actor and its presence in world affairs.
9. Discuss and critically evaluate future prospects and challenges in the dynamics of cooperation and further integration in Europe.
