The main objectives of the course are to:

- provide a broad overview of the field of legal anthropology the comparative study of law, legal institutions, and other modes of dispute processing and regulation, in both contemporary and historical cultural settings.
- introduce and discuss current debates related to anthropology and law.
- reflect critically on each student's culture and legal framework.

- 2. Analyze the concepts of law, legal institutions, disputes and dispute processing and regulation through anthropological theories and findings.

- 4. Apply theories in order to analyze subjects in juxtaposition to culture and law.
- 5. Conduct research and present on related issues and be able to organize the available time and cope with deadlines.
