## **Course Objectives:**

The course objectives are to:

Thoroughly explain and discuss the principles and criteria upon which a person's criminal responsibility will be assessed, focusing primarily on the relevant principles fundamental to criminal liability and the current state of the law. Discuss criminal law principles and explain case law evolvement. During this course, the necessary legal method to identify legal issues and provide answers according to the law will be analysed. Criminal Law general principles will be discussed and explored through case law scenarios emphasising relevant authorities and applicable legislation.
