### Objectives of the Course:

The course aims to examine the interaction between the cultural traditions of ethnic groups in a state to the law, drawing on the way English law approaches British ethnic minorities and comparing it with the way the Cyprus Constitution treats communities and religious groups.

### Learning Outcomes:

After completion of the course students are expected to be able to:

1. Discuss the protection of minorities within a selected range of countries, as case study examples.
2. Evaluate the extent to which minorities may require special protection, to the point of positive discrimination, under the municipal law of a State.
3. Appraise the extent to which cultural relativism can be justified in multicultural states within what is becoming, increasingly, a global village.
4. Demonstrate the function played by the Council of Europe and its instruments on minority rights within the national legal systems of member countries.
5. Discuss the international legal standards on minority rights, as enshrined / reflected in the work of the United Nations.
6. Assess the needs of different types of minority.
7. Evaluate the majority/minority/community conundrum in Cyprus.
8. Apply sociological factors into a legal context.

### Course Content:

During the course, the student will cover the following:

1. Ethnicity, culture and law: an introduction
2. Migrants and old minorities in the UK, Cyprus and Europe

3. Cultural identity
4. Universalism and cultural relativism in the law
5. Tolerance and human rights
6. Developments in English law (including, judicial stances on cultural diversity)
7. European and international instruments on minority rights
8. Case studies: Jews, Gypsies and Muslims in the UK
9. Cyprus Constitution and the rights of communities and religious groups
10. Inter-communal strife and dealing with diversity
11. Migrants and minorities in Cyprus
