Course Objectives:

The course aims to adequately familiarize the students with the doctrine and praxis of international criminal law. Jurisprudence, international instruments, and national implementation measures will be discussed thoroughly. The course will examine the crime of genocide, war crimes, crimes against humanity and the crime of aggression through the ICC case law and the Rome Statute along with the case law of ad hoc tribunals and international legislation. The states' obligation to criminalize atrocities prosecute or extradite (aut dedere aut judicare) will be analysed and critically discussed through historical, legal, and political considerations underlying the international criminal justice project. The international procedure, criminal prosecution and evidence will be examined through case law and in relation to current global justice trends.

Learning Outcomes:

After completion of the course, students are expected to be able to:

- 1. Understand the evolution of the international criminal justice project along with the function of international criminal law and public international law.
- 2. Realise and explain the history and the role of international prosecution along with national prosecution of international crimes and states' cooperation with respect to the national proceeding
- 3. Distinguish between core international crimes and transnational crimes
- 4. Explain and discuss the general principles of liability and distinguish between individual



- and collective responsibility
- 5. Demonstrate ability to present arguments (orally and written) for defences and excuses both for conviction and sentencing reasons.

Course Content:

The course will include the following chapters:

- 1. Basic Phases in the Development of International Criminal Law, theories of international crimes and first-generation crimes
- 2. War Crimes: International and Non-International Armed Conflicts
- 3. The Crime of Genocide: Protected Groups, Constituent Acts, Specific Intent and Modes of Liability
- 4. Crimes Against Humanity: Normative Theories and Dynamic Interpretation
- 5. The Crime of Aggression
- 6. Sidelined crimes: organized economic crime, famine-related crimes, crimes against the environment
- 7. Individual and collective responsibility, and modes of liability
- 8. Defences and Excuses. The Rome Statute provisions and the ad hoc tribunals' case law.
- 9. International criminal justice modes, Complementarity and the De-centralised Enforcement of International Norms
- 10. International Criminal Court's procedure: perpetrators and victims. Recent case law
- 11. International Criminal Justice Project through critical lens

Learning Activities and Teaching Methods:

Lectures, class discussion, group exercises, case studies, discussion fora, moot court & presentations.

Assessment Methods:

Presentations, class assignments, midterms, and final exams.
