### Course Objectives:

The main objectives of the course are to:

- Familiarize students with the logic and methods of social science research.
- Provide students with solid empirical, theoretical and normative foundations for the understanding of social science research in general and research in international relations in particular.
- Introduce students to the research design methodologies of conceptualization and operationalization so as to contribute to their ability to understand, interpret and explain the main theories in their specific research field.
- Develop students' necessary skills to design and conduct their own research and to participate in and contribute to academic knowledge.

- Demonstrate extensive knowledge of research methods used in the fields of International Relations in particular and Social Sciences more generally.
- Present a thorough understanding of the complexity of the study area and its relationship to other adjacent research areas.

- Communicate in the English language both orally and in written form at a high level of competence as necessary for the design and conduct of research.

- Utilize computer skills (word processing, Internet use and e-mail) as study and communication tools.
- Demonstrate learning skills that will enable them to participate in research of international phenomena with minimal supervision.
- Make effective use of library resources, bibliographic sources and other existing academic research.
