#### Objectives of the Course

- 1. To provide the necessary skills for improvisation in the various styles of the jazz idiom
- 2. To impart a strong sense of appreciation for the art of improvisation and its contribution to the art of music
- 3. To underline the jazz knowledge that will provide the basis of understanding "the jazz song".
- 4. To demonstrate alternative ways to the traditional way of looking at harmony.

## **Learning Outcomes**

After completion of the course students are expected to be able to:

- 1. Define the various styles of music in which improvisation plays a major role and estimate the value of such an art.
- 2. Demonstrate the fundamental skills Major Requirement in efficient improvisation
- 3. Apply competently the art of improvisation to instant compositions or compositions that include improvisation as their main element.
- 4. Compose music based on improvisation and thus collaborate musically with each other.
- 5. Analyze any standard repertoire jazz tune with Roman numerals, brackets and arrows demonstrating the function of each chord as well as the melodic content.
- 6. Understand the function of the scales within a jazz tune.
- 7. Reharmonize any melody given to them with the use of substitute dominants, modal interchange chord as well as symmetrical scales.

8. Differentiate between the modes of the major and melodic minor scales.
