Course purpose and objectives	Pharmacists, as healthcare professionals, are the first point of call in the community. There is no need for appointment to speak and consult a pharmacist and members of the public/patients can receive free, unbiased advice almost anywhere. A community pharmacist is often the first health professional the patient seeks advice from and, as such, provides a filtering mechanism whereby minor self-limiting conditions can be cured with the appropriated treatment/medications and patients with more severe symptoms/pathology referred on to the doctor for further investigation. On a typical day, a community pharmacist can realistically expect to help between 5 and 10 individuals/patients.  Additionally, members of the public present to pharmacists and their staff in three ways: Requesting advice about symptoms  Asking to purchase a named medicine  Requiring general health advice  This module contains all the essential information required for managing symptoms presented in the pharmacy, and covers the common ailments that pharmacists are likely to be presented with.
