Objectives of the Course:

The main objectives of the course are to:

- Introduce concepts of sexual identity, trafficking, sexual harassment in the working environment, child and adult pornography
- Examine the challenges and opportunities of social work practice working with this group of people by addressing the roles and functions of social workers within a complex society
- Introduce the skills and techniques applied in this area
- Explore the development of services in Cyprus and abroad as far as victims of human trafficking, victims of sexual abuse etc.
- Present good practices at a preventive and interventive level
- Describe the benefit of acquiring a broad base of knowledge of human sexuality as the basis for advanced social work practice.

Learning Outcomes:

After completion of the course students are expected to be able to:

- Work without prejudices as far sexual issues concern
- Identify vulnerable client systems and populations at risk for treatment and preventive services.
- Demonstrate appropriate professional comfort and ethical principles in dealing with clients' sexual concerns.
- Plan and implement formal and informal sex education and reeducation with a variety of client systems (e.g., adolescents, adults and couples of all ages, culturally diverse clients and those with health and developmental challenges) in individual, couple, family and group treatment formats.
- Develop a comprehensive psychosocial assessment and intervention for a variety of sex-related issues commonly presented by clients and at-risk populations, e.g., attitudes toward various sexual practices, masturbation,

unplanned pregnancy, infertility, child sexual abuse/incest, sexual assault survivors and perpetrators, out of control sexual behavior, concerns related to sexual orientation, sexually transmitted diseases, and disability/illness and sexuality.
