Outline the Benefits and Disadvantages of using Utilitarianism as a Foundational Ethic in a Public Healthcare Setting. 5. Critically evaluate the pivotal role ethics holds and describe why an 'Ethical Code' is needed in Public Health practice. 6. Analyse the main principles and values guiding public health practice. 7. Relate and contrast the terms Resilience and Burnout, and explain the importance of Dignified Working Conditions and the Role of the employer. 8. Examine the concept: 'Caring for the Carers' as part of Public Healthcare. 9. Examine and define the term 'Duty of Candour'. 10. Outline the need for healthcare organisations and staff therein to have an open and honest approach when dealing patients and the public. 11. Explain the need for honesty of a healthcare organisation and its staff when the death or serious harm has been or may have been caused to a patient, whether by an act or an omission. 12. Relate and contrast the terms 'Medical error' and 'Medical negligence'. 13. Examine the possible causes of medical error with reference to published literature. 14. Explain the aim and make-up of the 'Fitness to Practise Procedure' in the UK. 				

	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 15. Examine ways in which healthcare professionals can be supported when going through 'Fitness to Practise Procedures'. 16. Critically evaluate the roles and legal dimension of Research Ethics Committees and Institutional Review Boards (IRBs) in research. 17. Explain the ethical importance of safety monitoring in interventional studies. 18. Critically evaluate ethical issues involved in random allocation of treatment, use of placebo, allocation concealment, and blinding in randomized controlled trials. 19. Explain the concepts of interim analysis in interventional studies, and critically evaluate the ethical and other criteria for terminating a study. 20. Analyse ethical issues involved in the conduct of epidemiological research. 21. Analyse ethical issues involved in the conduct of qualitative research relevant to Public Health. 22. Analyse the ethical and legal dimension of taking informed consent from children. 23. Analyse the ethical and legal dimension of taking informed consent from mentally unstable and/or cognitively impaired individuals. 24. Analyse the ethical and legal dimension of taking informed consent from vulnerable population groups. 25. Analyse the ethical and legal dimension of taking an informed consent from participants as part of conducting research. 26. Analyse the ethical and legal dimension of privacy of personal (individual/patient) data. 27. Critically evaluate the regulatory issues involved in drug development, including the different phases of approval. 28. Critically evaluate the ethical and legal aspects of routine disease screening. 29. Critically evaluate the ethical and legal implications of genetic testing. 30. Critically evaluate the ethical and legal implications of programmes aiming at health-related behavioural change for preventing disease. 31. Critically evaluate the ethical and legal issues surrounding organ donation. 32. Relate and contrast professionalism, professionalization, and professional conflicts in Healthcare. 33. Critically evaluate the ethical aspects involved in professional accountability, clinical governance, performance and appraisal.
